Since starting in September of 2000, SNAP has...

- Fixed 16,734 cats and dogs that live in low income households.
- Spent \$579,989 to get those animals spayed/neutered.
- Used 95% of every donated dollar to pay veterinary services for spay/neuter.
- Managed this with no paid staff.


Case # 13 – Ben has four large dogs and two female cats. All were strays except for a female pit bull. Between the six animals, there have been four litters. Ben lives just outside Ozark, has a minimum wage job, pays child support, and has not applied for public assistance. He has wanted to get the animals fixed for a couple of years but just does not have the extra money to do it. SNAP's cost to get all of the animals fixed is \$430.00. Ben can contribute \$50.

Case #14 – Diane is a single parent with two children in Greene County and lives on less than \$10,000 a year. They took in a stray female dog and found a young male cat wandering around a Wal-Mart parking lot. They can provide a loving home to these animals but need spay/neuter help. The cost to get both animals fixed is \$95; Diane can pay \$20 of the cost.

Case #15 – Dan and his wife have two cats that were fixed thru SNAP a couple of years ago. A few months ago, five cats showed up at their home. They have had one fixed but do not have extra money to take care of the remaining four cats due to a serious medical issue and no health insurance. The cost for SNAP would be \$160 for surgeries for one female and three male cats.

If you are able to help fix any of these animals, please send your donation to SNAP, PO Box 14354, Springfield, MO 65814. You can specify which case you would like to help on the memo line. In the event the case you specify has already been helped by another caring donor, your contribution will be used to help a different but equally inneed pet owner as determined by the SNAP team.
